Mississippi State Interesting Facts:

The Mississippi Territory was organized in 1798, and it joined the Union as the 20th state in 1817. Through the mid-19th century, slave labor propelled Mississippi to become the top cotton producer in the country. The Magnolia State was the second state to secede from the Union in 1861. The state's location alongside the Mississippi River made it a strategic military location during the Civil War. The state suffered greatly during the war, losing nearly 10,000 soldiers.

The 13th Amendment, which abolished slavery, was ratified after three-fourths of the states passed it in 1865 at the close of the war. While four others eventually passed the amendment, Mississippi did not symbolically and officially adopt it until 1995 – and didn't officially notify Washington of the vote until 2013.

The state was a battleground during the civil rights movement of the mid-20th century. In 1962, violent riots broke out on the "Ole Miss" campus when James Meredith, a Black Air Force veteran, attempted to integrate the all-white state university. In 1963, he became the university's first Black graduate.
